And the city was pure gold, like unto clear glass. The buildings of the city are like sparkling clear glass no doubt reflecting the various rainbow colours of the foundations of the wall like a diamond reflects different colours in the sun. Gold is a reminder of the character that is bought from Jesus with the white raiment and eye salve. Those that enter the city will have a character of gold that has been tried in the furnace of affliction so that they can be like Jesus and be with Him for ever.

The precious stones of the foundation of the wall of the city which had on them the names of the twelve tribes of the children of Israel were very similar to the twelve precious stones in the ephod of the High Priest. The stones on the ephod were all set in gold showing that they all pass through the fiery trials that purifies them as gold and have all bought the gold of faith that works by love and purifies the soul from Jesus their great High priest.

The first foundation is the same colour as the wall and the glorious light of the city which is red. Jesus as the heavenly High Priest wears this colour near His heart on the breastplate showing that those that struggle to overcome their sins and weaknesses are very dear to Him.

The second foundation stone is sapphire which is a blue colour. Blue was a colour that was chosen by God as a reminder to His people to keep the Ten Commandments of God.

The sapphire was also on the breastplate of the High Priest showing that Jesus has on His heart those that keep all His Ten Commandments including the Seventh Day Sabbath.

Gods throne is built on the principle of obedience to the Ten Commandments which are a transcript of His character.

The third foundation stone was a chalcedony. This precious stone is of misty grey colour, clouded with blue, yellow, or purple. Grey in the Bible is a symbol of old age. Those that God has preserved with the various character traits that blue, which we have already noticed, along with yellow and purple which we will notice later, are reminiscent of those that this stone represents. Another word for grey in the Bible is hoar.

The fourth precious stone fond in the foundations of the wall is emerald. This stone is bright green in colour. Green is a symbol of trust, hope and faith. Those that this stone represents have a rich measure of the gift of faith.

The fifth precious stone is the sardonyx. This is a precious stone marked by the red colours of the carnelian (sard) and the white of the onyx. White is made up of all the colours of the rainbow. Those that those stone represent have characteristics of every colour but especially the red. White in the Bible is a symbol of righteousness.

The sixth foundation stone is the sardius. This stone is also red reminding us of the cleansing of Jesus blood from our sins.

The seventh precious stone found in the wall foundations is chrysolite. This is a precious stone of golden colour. Gold as we have noticed earlier stands for faith and love the character traits which the tribe written on this stone represent.

The eighth stone which had one of the tribes of Israel written on it is beryl. Green is once again the colour of this stone. Green is the most common colour in the foundation stones being found four times followed by red three times. Green is also found in the rainbow around the throne.

The nineth stone is topaz. This stone is greenish yellow. Yellow is the colour of gold and represents the same character of faith that works by love.

The tenth precious stone of the wall is chrysoprasus. This stone of green colour, inclined to that of gold, from whence it has its name; for this is agate in the breast plate, which was Naphtali's stone.

The eleventh foundation stone representing another tribe of the saved is jacinth. This name comes from hyacinth, the name of a flower, also of a precious stone of the same colour, a dark blue verging on black.

The twelfth foundation stone is amethyst. This is a precious stone of a violet and purple colour. This is the last colour of the rainbow to be represented. This colour represents both royalty and priesthood. Those that come from this tribe have leadership qualities and intercede for others as the priest did in the earthly sanctuary services. Purple along with blue and white are royal colours.
