#### What are some of the things that the Bible forbids us to eat?

1. Animals that do not both chew the cud and have a parted hoof such as pigs (swine), squirrels, camels, rabbits, mice, rats, dogs, cats, lizards, tortoise, ferrets, moles, frogs and many others are forbidden to be eaten. (Lev 11:1-8; Deut 14:3-8; Lev 11:27-31).

**Pork, although one of the most common articles of diet,** is one of the most injurious. God did not prohibit the Hebrews from eating swine's flesh merely to show His authority, but because it was not a proper article of food for man. It would fill the system with scrofula, and especially in that warm climate produced leprosy, and disease of various kinds. Its influence upon the system in that climate was far more injurious than in a colder climate. But God never designed the swine to be eaten under any circumstances. The heathen used pork as an article of food, and American people have used pork freely as an important article of diet. Swine's flesh would not be palatable to the taste in its natural state. It is made agreeable to the appetite by high seasoning, which makes a very bad thing worse. Swine's flesh above all other flesh meats, produces a bad state of the blood. Those who eat freely of pork can but be diseased. Those who have much outdoor exercise do not realize the bad effects of pork eating, as those do whose life is mostly indoors, and whose habits are sedentary, and whose labor is mental. Ellen G. White, Counsels on Diet and Foods, pages 392,393.

The tissues of the swine swarm with parasites. Of the swine God said, "It is unclean unto you: ye shall not eat of their flesh, nor touch their dead carcass." Deuteronomy 14:8. This command was given because swine's flesh is unfit for food. Swine are scavengers, and this is the only use they were intended to serve. Never, under any circumstances, was their flesh to be eaten by human beings. It is impossible for the flesh of any living creature to be wholesome when filth is its natural element and when it feeds upon every detestable thing. Ellen G. White, Ministry of Healing, pages 313,314.

But it is not the physical health alone which is injured by pork eating. The mind is affected, and the finer sensibilities are blunted by the use of this gross article of food. It is impossible for the flesh of any living creatures to be healthy when filth is their natural element, and when they will feed upon every

detestable thing. The flesh of swine is composed of what they eat. If human beings eat their flesh, their blood and their flesh will be corrupted by impurities conveyed to them through the swine. Ellen G. White, Counsels on Diet and Foods, page 393.

Some animals that are brought to the slaughter seem to realize what is to take place, and they become furious, and literally mad. They are killed while in that state; and their flesh prepared for market. Their meat is poison, and has produced, in those who have eaten it, cramp, convulsions, apoplexy, and sudden death. Yet the cause of all this suffering is not attributed to meat. Some animals are inhumanly treated while being brought to the slaughter. They are literally tortured, and after they have endured many hours of extreme suffering, are butchered. Swine have been prepared for market even while the plague was upon them, and their poisonous flesh has spread contagious diseases, and great mortality has followed. Ellen G. White, Selected Messages Book 2, page 419.

Those who subsist largely upon flesh-meats inflame the stomach thereby, the blood becomes torpid and impure, head-aches and indispositions follow. The system is filled with humors; fevers, scrofula and cancers are the consequences. Especially is this true of those who eat swine's flesh. Ellen G. White, The Signs of the Times, the  $6^{th}$  of January, 1876.

The use of swine's flesh is contrary to His express command, given not because He wished to especially show His authority, but because it would be injurious to those who should eat it. Its use would cause the blood to become impure, so that scrofula and other humors would corrupt the system, and the whole organism would suffer. Especially would the fine, sensitive nerves of the brain become enfeebled and so beclouded that sacred things would not be discerned, but be placed upon the low level with common things. Ellen G. White, Testimonies to the Church, Volume 2, page 96.

All fish and water creatures that do not have both fins and scales such as catfish, eels, lobsters, shrimp, prawns, clams, oysters, crabs, shellfish, squid, octopus and others.

"All shellfish are periodically subjected to toxicity tests. Samples are injected in mice – if they live, the mollusks are presumed safe. In the first stage of nerve action, there is a massive flow of ions through channels in the walls of the nerve cell into the body of the cell itself. It was found that saxitoxin ingredient found in shellfish somehow clogs these channels and prevents the ion transfer from happening. Without the transfer the cells fail and paralysis occurs." Article in Newsweek Magazine entitled "The Poison in Shellfish," January 10, 1972, page 39.

Investigation indicates that a diet rich in animal fats tends to raise the levels of cholesterol and the related fats and lipids in the blood. Evidence strongly indicates that people with such high levels are more likely to develop atherosclerosis and heart attacks than those with lower levels...People who naturally have abnormally high levels of cholesterol—especially low-density—lipoproteins can reduce their risk of heart attack by lowering their blood cholesterol. This can be done by following a diet low in saturated fats...Encyclopedia Encarta 1998, article cholesterol

Over 20 prospective studies have been made on thousands of people in 14 countries. They have all found that the three biggest risk factors for coronary heart disease are a high plasma total **cholesterol**, cigarette smoking, and high blood pressure (hypertension).

From a global viewpoint such countries as Great Britain, Finland, Ireland, New Zealand, the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Australia, Hungary, and the United States are high plasma **cholesterol** countries, consuming high-fat diets and experiencing high incidences of coronary heart disease.

In residents of these countries plasma **cholesterol** (total and LDL) can be consistently reduced by combining the following dietary changes (listed in order of effectiveness): (1) reduce saturated fat as much as possible, (2) reduce energy intake if overweight, (3) increase consumption of vegetables, legumes, fruits, and cereals (preferably whole grain),

(4) partly replace the reduced saturated fat with moderate increase of polyunsaturated and some monounsaturated oils, and (5) reduce dietary **cholesterol**. In practical dietetics these translate to avoiding butter, hydrogenated margarine, lard and suet, full-cream milk, cream, meat fat, frying, chocolate, and sausages; to restricting egg yolks, most cheeses, cakes, pastries, and cookies; and to eating more vegetables, legumes, fruits, bread, rice, pasta, breakfast

cereals, polyunsaturated oils (*e.g.*, sunflower seed, safflower, corn oils)... Investigations into the effects of alcohol on the brain now indicate that drinking at moderate levels can impair cognitive powers (such as awareness, perception, judgment, recognition, reason) even to the next day, when the drinker is sober." L. Gross, How Much Is Too Much? The Effects of Social Drinking, New York, NY; Random House, 1983, page 161.

There is no safe level of alcohol consumption. Effects of alcohol use include liver damage such as cirrhosis, and alcoholic hepatitis, heart and blood disorders, depression, gastritis, stomach ulcers, damage to unborn foetus and 10ut of every 10 drinkers become totally dependent on alcohol addiction. Social effects include conflicts in relationships; physical abuse to spouse, family neglect, violence, crime, rape, murder and accidents (highest cause of death in under 25's). Alcohol is a powerful depressant drug which if you drink enough will cause you to sleep forever. It is a poor quality food with lots of calories and no nutrients. And it is a highly toxic chemical that can damage every organ in the body. AdHealth Bringing Health to Life, Ray Baird and Terry Butler, 1999.

The brain is the organ most sensitive to the presence of alcohol. The most immediate and dramatic consequence of the ingestion of any amount of alcohol is the impaired efficiency of the brain with its related central nervous system. Such an impairment takes the form of "decreased inhibitions, less efficient vision and hearing, slurring of speech, difficulty in the performance of gross motor skills, deterioration of judgment, increased reaction time, and a general feeling of euphoria." Charles R. Carrol, "Alcohol: Use, Nonuse and Abuse (Dubuque, Iowa, 1975), pages 37-41.

The degree and extent of mental impairment is related to the Blood-alcohol level. Studies indicate that definite impairments begin at about 0.03 percent, which is achieved simply by drinking a 12-ounce can of beer or 5 ½ ounces of ordinary wine by an average 150 pound person. Rolla N. Harger, "The Response of the Body to Different Concentrations of Alcohol: Chemical tests for intoxication," Alcohol Education for Classroom and Community, ed. Raymond G. McCarthy (New York 1964), page 98

Medical authorities recognize that even one drink can impair judgment in some persons. In her Book, "Teaching About Alcohol, France Todd writes: "The finer grades of judgment, concentration and understanding are the first to be affected. After as little as one drink such affects may occur, and they increase rapidly as the alcohol concentration in the blood is raised in subsequent drinks." (New York 1964), page 68.

During the baseline memory task moderate drinkers had significantly lower memory ratios than did light drinkers, suggesting that the heavier drinking may differentially impair the ability to retain information or possibly result in a faster decay of memory traces." "The relationship of Age and drinking habits to the effects of Alcohol on Memory in Women," Marilyn K. Jones and Ben Morgan Jones, Journal of Studies on Alcohol, Vol.41, No 1, 1980.

It is noteworthy that even within the liquor industry, there are some who caution against the danger of even one drink, if driving. In an eight-page publicservice advertisement in the August 1985 "Readers Digest," Seagrams emphasized the well-known rule that drinking and driving do not mix at all: "The safe rule for yourself and others is: NONE – for the road!" If alcohol impairs the mental reflexes of people driving on the cement roadways, does it not impair the mental responses of Christians journeying on the way to the kingdom? To impair out moral judgment by the means of alcohol means to destroy

the very discriminatory sense of right and wrong God has implanted in us." Wine in the Bible, A Biblical Study on the Use of Alcoholic Beverages, by Samuele Bacchiocchi, page 297.

The liver is a very sensitive to the ill effects of alcohol. Some studies have shown that "intake of relatively small amounts of alcohol (1-2 ounces) by nonalcoholics can lead to the accumulation of fat in the liver cells." William B, Terhume, "The Safe Way to Drink: How to Prevent Alcohol Problems Before They Start (New York, 1968), page 24.

A vital function of the liver is to maintain a proper level of blood sugar (glucose), which is the main source of energy used by the brain cells. When alcohol is present in the bloodstream, the liver devotes all of its efforts to metabolizing it. To do so, the liver sometimes is unable to supply the brain cells with adequate glucose. When this occurs, hypoglycemia can result. This is a condition in which the blood sugar level is below normal and the brain is deprived of its proper nourishment. Symptoms include sweating, headache, tremors, hunger and nervousness.

The most serious liver disease caused by alcohol consumption is cirrhosis. This is a disease in which the liver cells are destroyed and thus the organ is no longer able to process nutrients in the food. Samuele Bacchiocchi, "Wine in the Bible: A Biblical Study on the Use of Alcoholic Beverages," page 298.

## "About half of those who develop cirrhosis will die in five years." "Coming to Grips With Alcoholism," U. S. News & World Report (November 30, 1987), page 60.

Approximately 30,000 Americans die of cirrhosis every year. In the past cirrhosis has been generally associated with heavy drinking. However, "a recent French study suggests that men who have as little as three drinks a day, and women who take 1 ½ drinks a day, may be at increased risk of developing cirrhosis." "Coming to Grips With Alcoholism," U. S. News & World Report (November 30, 1987), page 60.

The ingestion of alcoholic beverages stimulates the flow of gastric juices. Alcohol can irritate the lining of the stomach, giving rise to a long-lasting inflammatory condition, known as gastritis. Gastric ulcers are frequently reported among alcohol drinkers. Too much gastric acid in the stomach irritates the ulcers, thus causing pain and retarding the healing process.

The excessive supply of gastric acids caused by the presence of alcohol in the stomach can cause a vital stoppage of digestion. The passage of the food from the stomach to the small intestine is delayed and the rate of absorption of various nutrients in the intestinal tract is diminished. Samuele Bacchiocchi, "Wine in the Bible: A Biblical Study on the Use of Alcoholic Beverages," page 298.

Such actions, combined with the nutrient-poor calories of alcohol itself, the depression of appetite, and the disturbance of normal digestive function common in heavy drinkers, combine to produce the severe malnutrition so often observed in alcoholic persons."

The use of alcohol affects the heart also, by possibly causing high blood pressure, and increasing the risk of strokes and heart attacks.

Experimental evidence reveals that intoxicating amounts of alcohol increase the oxygen consumption of heart muscle and result in decreased mechanical efficiency of the heart. Research indicates that red blood cells in the capillaries of drinkers tend to clump, thereby interfering with the adequate transport of oxygen to body cells.

The precise mechanism of how alcohol injures the heart is unknown, yet the various heart disorders related to drinking have been known for a long time. Some of the disorders are: Congestive heart failure, irregular heart beat, enlarged heart, distended neck veins, pulse and blood pressure abnormalities, and swelling of the arms and legs. Charles R. Carrol, "Alcohol: Use, Nonuse and Abuse (Dubuque, Iowa, 1975), page 49.

In addition, alcohol inhibits the manufacture of red and white blood cells, which may result in anemia and weakened resistance to infection. "Coming to Grips With Alcoholism," U. S. News & World Report (November 30, 1987), page 60.

Sydney Cohen, a nationally recognizes authority on alcohol use, says: "Drinking Alcoholic beverages leads to increased risk of cancer at various sites of the body. Some of the sites mentioned are the tongue, the mouth, pharynx, larynx, esophagus, and liver." "The Substance Abuse Problems. New Insights for the 1980s. (New York 1983), Vol. 2, p. 119.

The above survey briefly mentioned only some of the effects of alcohol on the human body. Numerous other medical consequences of alcohol could be presented , such as effects on the reproductive system, the esophagus, the pancreas, the kidneys, the muscles, the lungs, the thyroid etc. The examples given should suffice to show that alcohol does take a very heavy toll on the human body. Samuele Bacchiocchi, "Wine in the Bible: A Biblical Study on the Use of Alcoholic Beverages," page 298.

We hope that at this meeting those who understand the principles of health reform will exert a strong influence on the side of temperance. Let Christ's followers abstain not only from alcohol, tobacco, tea, and coffee, but also from every other harmful thing that beclouds the brain. The enemy has arranged matters so as to ensnare the greatest number. He leads men and women to use stimulating food and food that beclouds the nerve-power of the brain, so that they are unable to distinguish between right and wrong, between good and evil. Parents, teach the members of your household that indulgence of appetite is the work of the enemy. Teach them to guard against his deceptions. Such instruction should be given by everyone who takes the responsibility of bringing children into the world; and especially at this stage of the world's history fathers and mothers should realize that their children are the property of God, and that He holds them accountable to bring up their children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. If they yield to his temptations they do not stop; appetite clamors for indulgence and is gratified to their ruin. The brain is benumbed and clouded; reason no longer holds the reins, but they are laid on the neck of lust. Licentiousness, adultery, and vices of almost every type are committed as the result of indulging the appetite for wine and cider. A professor of religion who loves these stimulants, and accustoms himself to their use, never grows in grace. He becomes gross and sensual; the animal passions control the higher powers of the mind, and virtue is not cherished. Ellen G. White, Testimonies to the Church, Volume 5, pages 356,357.

Look at our young men. And I write now what causes my heart to ache. They have lost their will power. Their nerves are enfeebled, because their power is exhausted. The ruddy glow of health is not upon their countenances. The healthy sparkle of the eye is gone. Its luster is lost. The wine they have drunk has enfeebled the memory. They are like persons aged in years. The brain is no longer able to produce its rich treasures when required.--Manuscript 17, 1898. Ellen G. White, Temperance, page 36.

It is because human beings have chosen to listen to the tempter that we see men and women partaking of that which robs them of their reason. In our large cities there are saloons on the right hand and on the left, tempting passers-by to indulge an appetite which, once established, is exceedingly hard to overcome. The youth should be trained never to touch tobacco or intoxicating drink. Alcohol robs men of their reasoning powers. Watch that man entering the saloon. His eye is bright, and his step steady. Watch him as he comes out. The brightness has gone from his eye, and as he walks, he staggers from side to side. He is drunk,--a specimen of the work done by the saloon. Ellen G. White, Advent Review and Sabbath Herald, the 15<sup>th</sup> of June, 1905.

The history of Nadab and Abihu is also given as a warning to man, showing that the effect of wine upon the intellect is to confuse. And it will ever have this influence upon the minds of those who use it. Therefore God explicitly forbids the use of wine and strong drink.-- Signs of the Times, July 8, 1880.

Persons may become just as really intoxicated on wine and cider as on stronger drinks, and the worst kind of inebriation is produced by these so-called milder drinks. The passions are more perverse; the transformation of character is greater, more determined and obstinate. A few quarts of cider or sweet wine may awaken a taste for strong drinks, and many who have become confirmed drunkards have thus laid the foundation of the drinking habit. . . . Moderate drinking is the school in which men are receiving an education for the drunkard's career. The taste for stimulants is cultivated; the nervous system is disordered; Satan keeps the mind in a fever of unrest; and the poor victim, imagining himself perfectly secure, goes on and on, until every barrier is broken down, every principle sacrificed. Ellen G. White, Healthful Living, page 112.

The taste created for the disgusting, filthy poison, tobacco, leads to the desire for stronger stimulants; as liquor, which is taken on one plea or another for some imaginary infirmity or to prevent some possible disease. Thus an unnatural appetite is created for these hurtful and exciting stimulants; and this

appetite has strengthened until the increase of intemperance in this generation is alarming. Beverage-loving, liquor-drinking men may be seen everywhere. Their intellect is enfeebled, their moral powers are weakened, their sensibilities are benumbed, and the claims of God and heaven are not realized, eternal things are not appreciated. The Bible declares that no drunkard shall inherit the kingdom of God. Ellen G. White, Testimonies to the Church, Volume 4, page 30.

So gradually does Satan lead away from the strongholds of temperance, so insidiously do wine and cider exert their influence upon the taste, that the highway to drunkenness is entered upon all unsuspectingly. The taste for stimulants is cultivated; the nervous system is disordered; Satan keeps the mind in a fever of unrest; and the poor victim, imagining himself perfectly secure, goes on and on, until every barrier is broken down, every principle sacrificed. The strongest resolutions are undermined, and eternal interests are too weak to keep the debased appetite under the control of reason. Some are never really drunk, but are always under the influence of mild intoxicants. They are feverish, unstable in mind, not really delirious, but as truly unbalanced; for the nobler powers of the mind are perverted. Ellen G. White, Temperance, page 93.

Tobacco and liquor stupefy and defile the user. But the evil does not stop here. He transmits irritable tempers, polluted blood, enfeebled intellects, and weak morals to his children, and renders himself accountable for all the evil results that his wrong and dissipated course of life brings upon his family and the community. The race is groaning under a weight of accumulated woe, because of the sins of former generations. And yet with scarcely a thought or care, men and women of the present generation indulge intemperance by surfeiting and drunkenness, and thereby leave, as a legacy for the next generation, disease, enfeebled intellects, and polluted morals.
